Updates:	The Research Policy and Advocacy sub-committee is one of the AAAPC 4 foundation sub-committees.
	The subcommittee gives members a chance to reflect upon and contribute to AAAPC policy positions on topics ranging from the value of primary care to determining what initiatives should be endorsed by AAAPC.
	We were able to build this year on the major investments we made during 2019-2020 on the way the committee was constituted and how it worked. As a reminder we have 17 members from a range clinical and non clinical backgrounds. We have as well a good range of professional experience – from early career researchers to those in senior academic roles.
	Our model of having small working groups focussed on key issues that requires AAAPC responses has worked well with most members having been actively involved in the writing of policies and responses that include work on:

For the next year, early work will be to finalise our Value of Primary Care statement, to be a major driver of work to optimise the work of Practice Based Research Networks and to explore ways to make an impact into policy considerations in New Zealand's primary care system.
